Downtown Route

Historic Centre Square

Situated on land once belonging to sons of William Penn, the Square is one of the few places where the Declaration of Independence was publically read in 1776. Easily identified by the 75-ft tall Soldier's and Sailor's Monument dedicated in 1900, home to the Easton Farmer's Market which runs May-December, and a 9/11 Firefighter's Memorial, Center Square is truly Easton's heart and soul.

2

Little Free Library (2 locations)

Promoting literacy and the love of reading by building free book exchanges, over 32,000 Little Free Library book exchanges around the world bring curbside literacy home, sharing over 1 million books annually. Easton's Little Free Libraries, with nearby benches, are a project of the Easton Main Street Initiative with help from local Boy and Cub Scout Troops.

Riverside Park/Karl Stirner Arts Trail

Beautiful Green Space in Historic Downtown Easton along the scenic Delaware and Lehigh Riverbanks, the 565-seat amphitheater hosts free concerts and the annual Riverside Festival of the Arts. The Arts Trail, named for Karl Stirner, godfather of Easton's arts renaissance, shares the last leg of its 2.5 mile path with our Downtown Route.

First United Church of Christ

Built in 1776, one of three buildings still standing in Easton from Revolutionary War times, this church served as a military hospital during the war and was the location for the signing of an important Indian Treaty in 1777. Starting as the German Reformed Church of Easton, it became the First Reformed of Easton and is now the First United Church of Christ.

Quadrant Book Mart and Coffee House

Home to 50,000 rare, used and out-of-print books, the Quadrant also serves up coffee, breakfast and lunch. Since the 1980's, it has been at this location in a two-story 19th century brick building on "Millionaire's Row" in Easton's historic district offering a cozy place of respite and books that charm.

Easton Area Neighborhood Center Urban Farm

The Urban Farm's volunteer staff provides fresh-grown produce and teaches sustainable gardening while donating much of the produce to the West Ward through the Veggie Van Project. The Center also provides transitional housing to working families, a food pantry and utility assistance to low-income community families.

Stewart Silk Mill

Stewart Silk Company opened on this 4-acre lot in the early 1900's, later becoming Black Diamond Enterprises. Though weeds climb a rusty chain-link fence around its perimeter, a mural painted on an exterior Mill wall in 1996, by children from neighboring Cheston Elementary School, can still be seen through fading paint.

Christ United Methodist Church

Music and inclusivity are hallmarks of this South Side Easton landmark. The Church building is a beautiful, towering structure, dedicated in 1926, and serves the community through partnerships with mission work, food drives and by providing meeting space for local organizations.

Cheston Pioneer Park

This nice little pocket park, situated across the street from Cheston Elementary, is equipped with playground swings, slide and benches overlooking the expansive Pioneer Field. Great place for families to take a breather after your walk!

5

Ada B. Cheston Elementary School

Cheston enrolls about 550 students in elementary grade levels K-4. Part of the Easton School District, it has served students on Easton's Southside since 1967. In 2015, Cheston became a United Way Community School, which creates partnerships between the school and other community resources to better serve area families.

1 Easton Area Public Library
Easton Area Public Library has been serving the community since 1811, with its Historic Carnegie Building constructed in 1901. EAPL educates, entertains and challenges patrons of all ages through regular programming promoting appreciation of literature and the arts. The Library's Marx Room contains a trove of Easton's historical records, genealogies, and the original "Easton Flag."

2 State Theatre Center for the Arts
Home of the "FREDDY AWARDS," the regional school theater honors, year-round concerts, and national Broadway musicals, the State Theatre was originally known as Neumeyers Vaudeville House. It was renamed "The State" in 1926 after extensive renovations and joined the National Register of Historic Places in 1982. Its Beaux-Arts style facade and large overhanging marquee are a stand-out on this route.

3 St. Luke's Easton Dental Center
Conveniently located in downtown Easton, St. Luke's Easton Dental Center is dedicated to providing the community with high quality and accessible dental care.

4 The Crayola Experience
Crayola has been a part of the Easton area since 1900. The first box of Crayola crayons was made along the Bushkill Creek in 1903 and contained red, orange, yellow, green, blue, violet, brown, and black crayons. It sold for a nickel. Crayola Experience is a one-of-a kind family destination featuring 26 fun attractions where color, chemistry, and technology magically combine to create a colorful adventure for a child's imagination.

5 Lot Spot
Benches, picnic tables, and a Little Free Library are available at this lovely place to stop for a rest, for lunch, or to enjoy the surrounding greenery.

6 D R Market
Hablamos Español! This corner local grocery with Spanish and American foods for purchase is taking part in the Healthy Corner Stores initiative. By making fresh food and staples available, area residents can walk for their grocery needs and support the local economy. Two blocks west of the new Easton Public Market, fresh foods and meats abound on this Route.
