	Acquired Brain Injury Program (ABIP) Update: Due to low enrollment and referrals, the ABIP		
	will end effective May 31, 2024. The ABIP will no longer be taking referrals after August 31,		
	2023. Services for new clients will not be approved after October 31, 2023, which does not allow for		
	the full year of rehab services, but eight months of services will provide a substantial amount of		
	rehabilitation. Over the course of four years, the ABIP spent a total of \$40,000 and has only		
	received 14 referrals. Of those referrals, four were enrolled into ABIP, three are in the		
	application process, and seven did not respond to the request to complete the ABIP		
	application. Drew Nagele presented additional sources that could be explored for outreach,

	to potentially increase referrals and allow for ABIP to continue. One recommendation was to conduct outreach to the Pennsylvania Hospital Association and target individuals that were previously enrolled in the BrainSTEPS program to increase referrals. He noted the importance of this program, particularly for individuals that sustained a brain injury (BI) as a result of substance use.		
	Ms. Adams acknowledged Mr. Nagele's request and stated these are sources should be explored. She asked that the Board continue to promote the program and to reach out to assist the DOH with making connections to the proposed sources. Ms. Adams reiterated the importance of working together and promoting these programs to ensure funding continues. Ms. Adams also stated that the Head Injury Program (HIP) could also be a target.		
	Department of Health (DOH), Head Injury Program (HIP): Since the written report was distributed, the DOH had the opportunity to meet with Community HealthChoices (CHC) Managed Care Organizations (MCO) to provide training on the HIP and the NeuroResource Facilitation Program. This training was requested as a result of the DOH Brain Injury Help Line receiving an increase of phone calls from CHC participants with a TBI, requesting to be enrolled into DOH's HIP. The participants were directed by their Service Coordinators. Since the participants needs are served under the CHC, they are unable to enroll into the HIP, as it is considered a duplication of services and therefore, it was determined that training was needed for the MCOs. 	 Standardized Trainings. The workgroup is currently developing two standardized trainings, each containing 10 slides, that anyone on the Board can use. These training slide decks could be housed on the Department's website or BIAPA's website. Frank Notaro stated that a lot of people are not familiar or comfortable using the BIAPA website, even though so much helpful information is on it. Monica Vaccaro stated BIAPA is currently reprogramming their website to allow for asynchronous training. Poster/PSA Contest. The workgroup discussed revisiting the idea to do a BI poster or PSA contest for students in high school to assist with awareness and promotion of BI programs. Brain Injury and Autism. Ms. Adams and Ms. Pae updated the Board on a request that was made by a parent with a child that has autism and recently sustained a TBI. The parent described the challenges of finding professionals that have experience of supporting both autism and TBI. The parent requested the Board develop a list of professionals that do have this experience. It was requested the Education and Resource Facilitation workgroup allot time during their monthly meetings to develop this list. 		
	Systems workgroup The workgroup had the opportunity to trial the National Association of State Head Injury Administrator's Online Brain Injury Screening and Support System (OBISSS), an electronic-based screening system that uses the OSU-TBI screening tool modified to include non-TBI. The cost is estimated to be \$6,500 per year. The benefits to using OBISSS are that it is standardized, the collected data can be compared to the national dataset, and it would contribute to the larger picture of national incidence of lifetime exposure. The drawbacks to using OBISSS would include the need to have a professional assist an individual to take the screening and to determine what the next steps would be if an individual were to screen

4. The Clinical Forum

This is a quarterly education webinar on key topics in neurorehabilitation. This will continue several times a year. The most recent one was held on 4/25/23. Chris Schaub, a behavior analyst with Collage Rehabilitation Partners, presented on the topic of Applied Behavior Analysis for Brain Injury Professionals.

Pennsylvania Coalition Against Domestic Violence (PCADV) Update Contact Information: Mae Reale, MReale@pcadv.org

During the past quarter, PCADV has been preparing for our regional networking meetings between EMTs and Domestic Violence (DV) advocates. These meetings will be held in person at the end of May and beginning of June. The focus of these meetings will be to get advocates and EMTs together to begin the process of thinking about they can collaborate to connect survivors who may have a TBI to healthcare and other supportive resources.

PCADV is working on creating county by county resource list. While this list in still in development, one activity that EMTs and advocates will engage in during their time together will be to look at the lists to determine what resources are needed or unnecessary. The list will be able to be accessed via QR code.

At a minimum, the list will have a plain language description of and contact information for the local DV program, the Brain Injury Resource Line, at least one community-based substance-use provider, one mental health provider, and the link to the PA DOH TBI website. The list will simply be a "Need Help?" type of resource list to ensure that if a patient has it on their phone (or is supplied a paper copy by the EMT), that it does not indicate that it was supplied because they disclosed domestic violence. The list/QR code can be given to any patient who may have experienced a TBI. Ideally, the QR codes will be displayed in each ambulance as a small "Need Help?" sign to ensure that it is easily accessed. The benefit of



having the list as a QR code is that each individual county will have their own QR code that can be edited as needed (i.e., if a listed resource is no longer available or a new resource needs to be added).

Additionally, we have been working on developing a TBI and DV training for EMTs that, once approved by both DOH's TBI and EMS arms, can be posted on TrainPA. This will allow EMTs to take the course and receive continuing learning credits. This is occurring as a result of a relationship that has been developed with PA's Bureau of Emergency Medical Services, with whom we are working to develop additional training for EMTs who are responding to DV. The TBI and DV module will be a part of series on DV that will be created.

NeuroResource Facilitation Program (NRFP)

As of 4/26/23, the NRFP has 118 referrals. To increase awareness of the NRFP, the NeuroResource Facilitators (NRFs) have conducted outreach activities to community organizations likely to support individuals with brain injury, as well as human service and health care professionals.



COVID-19 NRFP

The COVID-19 designated NRFs are continuing to provide support to individuals with a brain injury impacted by the virus. One of the NRFs is currently developing evidence-based articles/blog posts to inform individuals with brain injury and their family/caregivers on the following:

- COVID-19 and other infectious diseases
- Health implications of the disease
- Accessing quality and timely healthcare to manage the disease
- Self-advocacy for healthcare needs
- Safety precautions to prevent exposure

The articles will be published in the BIAPA monthly newsletter and posted on the Department's and BIAPA's website.

Participating Provider Agreements (PPA) for HIP providers were updated with an effective date of February 1, 2023. Most providers now have fully executed PPAs.

The new PPA has added several new therapies including Telehealth Cognitive Rehabilitation. With this new service added to the fee schedule, we are able to track how many HIP clients have been approved for Telerehab services. Service plans for clients who will be receiving this service have been updated and we now have 31 clients approved to receive service via Telerehab.

Site visits to HIP providers have begun and will take place from April 2023 to October 2023. A family engagement component has been added to the site visits. HIP Providers will be asked to choose a HIP client willing to meet with us in person or via video conference on the day of the site visit to answer question about their experience working with the provider.

TBI Advisory Board Workgroup Summaries

Summaries of the Health Equity, Education and Resource Facilitation, and Systems Workgroup meetings held after January 27th, 2023.

Health Equity Workgroup Update

Topic: New Board Member On-Boarding Process.

The Health Equity Workgroup worked on developing a New Board Member On-Boarding Process, which includes:

- New Attendees Welcome Wagon
- Peer Support Liaison
- Strengths Survey
- Pre-Application/Application Process

New attendees Welcome Wagon. Health Equity Workgroup members are responsible to simply welcome new attendee, explain process of the meeting, where lunch is, etc. If a current Board or attendee invited them, they will be responsible for taking care of this process.

• **First meeting**: This is not a time to offer Board membership or even application, but a time for the new attendee to experience the meeting.



• **Second meeting**: This should be the Vice-Chair's responsibility or his/her designee— to identify new attendees present at the meeting and then pair up each new attendee with a current Board member. This is to explore whether this person feels the Board is a good match for them and if they are a good match for the Board.

*Note – each new attendee would need to follow the process to apply for Board membership, so at no time should Board membership be offered or indicated as a 'for sure' for new attendees.

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Peer Support Liaison. The role of the Peer Support Liaison (PSL) is to assist interested individuals through the preapplication process, application process, and initial orientation. This is to be assigned at the new attendee's second Board meeting. The PSL will be responsible for the following activities:

- Welcome them to the meeting, sit with them, eat lunch, and provide support
- Share knowledge and experiences
- Answer any questions they may have
- Make introductions to other Board members and other attendees
- Foster a sense of belonging and inclusivity
- Connect them to resources for the Board/Workgroups
- Share the expectations of the Board/Workgroups
- Participate in helping the potential Board member in identifying their strengths to determine if they will make a
 good addition to the Board
- Assist the individual to complete the Strengths Survey and also facilitate the individual completing the Strengths Survey

- As an advocate, (Simple language "Have you ever helped another person to get what they needed?"
- Knowledge of funding, ("Do you know about the funding options for those with brain injury in PA?"
- Knowledge of resources
- Lived experiences
- Specific areas/questions for areas to address Board needs—ex. Legal, community engagement

Pre-Application/Application Process. Person attends ____# of meetings within one year, prior to discussing applying for Board space.

Education and Resource Facilitation Workgroup Update

Topic: Creation of a brief training that can be used to provide general knowledge about TBI and strategies to support survivors.

- Two separate pieces of training that have the same 'root'—one for non-TBI professionals who may be working with someone who has a TBI (i.e; an attorney, advocate, teacher, coach, etc.). The other is for caregivers and supportive people who have a personal relationship with someone who has a TBI.
- We have a draft of the training and are currently in the process of revising the draft.

Topic: Ensuring consistency with referrals to supports. Instead of having a vast number of resources and phone numbers, we would like to have one main go-to.

• Strategies to encourage using BIRL as the primary go-to number for information.



Systems Workgroup Update

Topic: Explore interventions in other service systems in which brain injury is over-represented and underserved.

The Systems Workgroup has been exploring interventions in the Mental Health and Substance Use service systems. The workgroup has been including more people from those systems in Pennsylvania in the workgroup meetings. The workgroup made presentations and proposals to the Office of Mental Health and Substance Abuse (OMHSAS).

Topic: Online Brain Injury Screening and Support System (OBISSS). The workgroup We have had presentations by state officials in Alabama and from the National Association of Head Injury Administrators (NASHIA) on the Online Brain Injury Screening and Support System (OBISSS).

The workgroup is currently exploring the following:

- 1) The ability to modify the approach to have a person, such as an intake worker or certified peer specialist, enter the data from their interview with participants into OBISSS.
- 2) The ability to add the Adult Symptom Questionnaire
- 3) The ability to add a referral to NeuroResource Facilitation
- 4) The ability for OBISS be accessed by Care Everywhere, the shareable electronic health record (may be limited for MH records).
