Coronavirus Information 23-24 School Year



COVID-19 is no longer a reportable condition in PA since the public health emergency ended on May 11th. However, please note from PA HAN 700:

"COVID-19 remains a reportable condition in the following counties with local health departments established under the Local Health Administration Law of 1951: Philadelphia, Montgomery, and Allegheny "Schools that are within local county or city health department jurisdiction should continue to follow local reporting guidelines and procedures.

Individual cases of influenza, respiratory syncytial virus (RSV), or COVID-19 do not need to be reported by the school/childcare center. However, regulations do require reporting of outbreaks for any condition.

Facilities will now report all outbreaks through the typical 1-877-PA HEALTH route rather than using the COVID RA accounts.

NASSNC Releases Action Agendas Calling for School Nurses to Declare Their Nursing Professionalism Across America

The National Association of State School Nurse Consultants (NASSNC) is challenging school nurses to declare they are Registered Nurses.

Today, the <u>National Association of State School Nurse Consultants (NASSNC)</u> released two <u>action agendas</u>: #1 Declare You are a Registered Nurse and #2 Explain School Nursing to School Administrators. School nurses should claim their professional preparation as Registered Nurses (RN). Using the RN credential documents their expertise and asserts their legal authority to practice professional nursing. School nurses should speak with one voice, universally and consistently using RN in all communication with school staff, parents, and the public. School administrators need to have a better understanding of the breadth and depth of the school nurses' knowledge and competence. The action agendas provide school nurses with strategies to accomplish both.

The public recognizes and respects the credential of Registered Nurse and understands they are vital healthcare providers. The COVID-19 pandemic spotlighted a range of RN roles from life-savers in hospital critical care to prevention specialists via community mass immunization clinics. As the sole healthcare provider in schools, school nurses provide direct health care services for students with increasingly complex physical and mental health issues as well as being public health champions for the school community.

School nurses are advocates, problem solvers, educators, negotiators, and navigators. NASSNC is calling for increased:

- Awareness that school nursing is anchored in preparation as an RN.
- Recognition of school nurses as experts at the intersection of health and learning.
- Use of school nurses' wide range of knowledge and skills to address health-related barriers to learning of individual students and to anticipate population health needs of the school community.

Vaping among Youth is a Public Health Concern. Nicotine significantly affects both Physical and Mental health of Youth. According to the 2022 National Youth Survey, more than 2.5 Million Youth Vape/ use E-cigarettes. 30% of High School Students Vape Daily and 86% use flavored Vapes. 380,000 Middle School Students Vape, 11.7% Vape Daily, and 82% use flavored Vapes.

With Youth spending about 7 hours per day in school, we have the unique opportunity to work together to improve the Lung Health of youth in Pennsylvania.

 steps of Ask, Counsel, Treat, and provides guidance, support, and best practices for effectively delivering
 ACT as a brief intervention for adolescents who identify as tobacco users, including e-cigarettes.
- Alternative to Suspension or Citation Program: Intervention for Nicotine Dependence: Education, Prevention, Tobacco and Health (INDEPTH): INDEPTH™ is a convenient alternative to suspension or citation that helps schools and communities address the teen vaping problem in a more supportive way. Instead of solely focusing on punitive measures. REGISTER for our FREE online training today!
- Not On Tobacco Youth Cessation Program- the Perfect Complement to INDEPTH, schools seeking to
 implement teen tobacco cessation programs can sign up for our Not On Tobacco (N-O-T) program. Not On
 Tobacco (N-O-T) is a voluntary teen-centered cessation program inclusive in addressing all tobacco product

- TRU in PA | Tobacco Resistance Unit is a movement throughout all of Pennsylvania to help youth, ages 12 to
 18, stay tobacco-free. All former TRU members who remain committed to creating a tobacco-free future for
 Pennsylvania, as well as all young adult advocates ages 18-21 years old, are invited to join TRU Plus!
- Conversation Guide for Parents: continue to raise awareness about the dangers of e-cigarettes through <u>Talk</u>
 <u>About Vaping</u> an awareness campaign encouraging parents to talk to their kids about vaping before it's
 too late.

Air Quality Training

The Environmental Health Capacity (EHC) Program is pleased to invite you to participate in a short nano learning course on air quality: https://youtu.be/mly_Z5iAYDk The EHC program is a Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) funded program under the Division of Environmental Health Epidemiology (DEHE) with the Pennsylvania Department of Health. EHC seeks to provide outreach and education on topics related to children's environmental health.

Children's environments, such as where they live, learn and play, may impact their health. Exposure to environmental hazards like mold, poor air quality or contaminated drinking water could lead to harmful health outcomes. Notably, infants and children have a higher risk of experiencing harm from exposure to environmental hazards. One environmental indicator that is of great importance to children's development is air quality. Air is an essential part of our lives. Children, whose lungs are still developing, have a higher risk of developing complications such as asthma due to poor air quality. Teaching these kids – our future leaders – about air quality is one of the first steps in creating environmental and public health change. The nano learning course should take a few minutes to complete and provides an overview of what the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Air Quality Index (AQI) is, why it is important, and how it can be included in classroom plans and activities. The content included in the nano training was retrieved from the <u>AirNow.gov</u> website and additional electronic resources are provided for you to use as needed.
