

Rittenhouse Jaunt - North Route

1 June 5 Memorial Park
On June 5, 2013, the demolition of a vacant building at 2138 Market Street collapsed a party wall, destroying a Salvation Army Thrift Store, killing six innocent people, injuring many others and impacting the entire city. The Philadelphia community has come together to build a park of healing and remembrance and to publicly state that it is imperative to value human life and building safety above all else.


2 Coxe Park
This modernistic “pocket” park and playground were created between 1971 and 1974. Neighbors are currently raising money to renovate this park.

3 Logan Circle
First called Northwest Square, Logan Circle was one of the five original planned squares laid out by William Penn. In the 1920s, it was designed to resemble the Place de la Concorde in Paris.

4 Sister Cities Park
Located on Logan Square in front of the Cathedral Basilica of Saints Peter and Paul, Sister Cities Park is named for Philadelphia’s sister cities around the world. It features a café, boat pond, commemorative fountain and miniature Wissahickon-inspired Children’s Discovery Garden.

5 Collins Park
This charming “pocket” park, designed by John Collins, is a hidden oasis filled with plants and eye-catching gates. In good weather, live music can often be heard.

Art Alliance - Wetherill Mansion

Built in 1906 for Samuel Price Wetherill, the mansion was donated to the Philadelphia Art Alliance by his daughter in 1926. The Art Alliance is the oldest multidisciplinary arts center in the country for visual, literary and performing arts.

2

Kimmel Center for the Performing Arts

Opened in 2001 and just one block from the Academy of Music, the Kimmel Center is home to nine resident performing arts groups, including the Philadelphia Orchestra. The enclosed lobby is used as a public space.

3

Academy of Music

One of the busiest halls in the world, the Academy of Music has been in continuous use as an opera house since it opened in 1857. Although the location was originally selected because it was free of traffic, the Academy is now the heart of the Avenue of the Arts (Broad Street).

Union League of Philadelphia


Designed by Horace Trumbauer and John Fraser, the Union League was founded in 1862 as a Patriotic Society to support the Union and the policies of Abraham Lincoln. Although it is now a private members-only-club, exhibits in the Heritage Center are open to the public.

Curtis Institute of Music - Curtis Mansion

The Curtis Institute of Music is one of the premiere music schools in the world. It has remained tuition-free, since its founding in 1924 by Mary Louise Curtis Bok. The building was originally the mansion of George W. Childs Drexel.

1

Christian Street Y

Founded by a group of clergy in 1889, the legendary Christian Street Y was Philadelphia's first and America's fourth African-American Y. As such, it served the whole city and influenced countless lives such as Adam Clayton Powell, Josephine Baker, Ed Bradley, Joe Louis, Joe Frazier, and Wilt Chamberlain to name just a few.

2

Marian Anderson House

One of the most internationally acclaimed singers of the twentieth century, Marian Anderson was also an important figure in the struggle for black artists to overcome racial prejudice. Born in this neighborhood, neighbors helped nurture Anderson's talent. This house was her "dream" home, purchased when she was 27.

Shiloh Baptist Church

Designed in 1870 by architects Fraser, Furness and Hewitt, this Victorian church was originally Episcopalian and named The Church of the Holy Apostles. In 1945, it was purchased by Shiloh, a church founded in 1842 and active in the underground railroad and the abolitionist movement.

U.S. Naval Home


The Philadelphia Naval Asylum was built in 1827 to house naval officers and seaman disabled in duty. Designed by William Strickland, it was one of the largest Greek Revival hospitals in the country. It is now a gated community.

Alexander Milne Calder House

Alexander Milne Calder, who designed the statue of William Penn on the top of City Hall, lived here as did his son Alexander Sterling Calder who designed the Fountain in Logan Circle. Best known third generation Alexander "Sandy" Calder lived only briefly in Philadelphia when he attended Germantown Academy for a few months in 1909.

Thomas Hockley House

Built in 1875 by Philadelphia's famed architect Frank Furness, this house has bricks of different shapes and colors in varied patterns creating a real feast for the eyes.

2

English Village

Closed to cars, this block is a secluded collection of Tudor-style houses developed in the 1920s. Its peacefulness contrasts with the bustling activity of nearby Walnut Street.

3

Schuylkill River Park and Community Garden

This pleasant park and community garden was formed in 1968 replacing the detritus of a former industrialized site. It includes an entrance to the new Schuylkill Banks Park and Boardwalk.

4

Fitler Square

Situated in what was once a textile-manufacturing and transportation center, this former brickyard was deemed a park in 1896 by city ordinance.

5

Rosenbach Muse

Located on one of Philadelphia's most beautiful streets, the Rosenbach Museum and Library houses one of the nation's truly important public collections of rare books.

6

Academy of Vocal Arts

Founded in 1934, the tuition-free school is one of the world's premiere institutions for training aspiring opera singers.
