Background

Zika virus is transmitted by infected *Aedes* species mosquitoes. An outbreak of Zika virus disease began in May 2015 in Brazil and spread throughout South America, Central America, the Caribbean and southern areas of North America. Since January 1, 2016, a total of 225 cases of confirmed or probable Zika virus infection have been reported among Pennsylvania residents. Symptoms of Zika virus infection include rash, fever, conjunctivitis, headache, joint pain, and muscle pain. However, it is estimated that 80% of persons infected with Zika virus do not have any symptoms.

Although Zika virus symptoms are generally mild or absent, infection during pregnancy is associated with birth defects including microcephaly and other brain abnormalities and developmental delays. For this reason, it is important to identify pregnant women who have evidence of Zika virus infection so that the pregnancy and infant may be monitored for abnormalities.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) have released updated testing guidelines indicating that Zika virus testing for asymptomatic pregnant women is no longer routinely recommended, but that healthcare providers should defer to the guidance of their state and local health departments. The Pennsylvania Department of Health (PA DOH) continues to recommend that all pregnant women with potential Zika virus exposure receive laboratory testing. Possible exposures include traveling to areas with local mosquito-borne transmission of Zika virus (https://www.cdc.gov/zika/geo/index.html) and sexual contact with a person infected with Zika virus. For testing to be useful, possible Zika virus exposure should have occurred within the past 12 weeks. Zika virus testing is available thorough commercial laboratories and the state public health laboratory.
