

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- **Annville Train Station** On October 30, 1891, the Reading Railroad constructed the current Annville Train Station. This station was in operation for passenger service until 1963 and for freight service until 1976. In 1976, Mr. Ron Rabena purchased the Annville Station from the Reading Railroad, dismantled it entirely, and transported it to his property in the New Cumberland area.
- Fred Miller Home As you cross Moyer Street, take notice of the brown stone colonial revival house. It was built by Fred Miller, a Lebanon Valley College graduate who later became president of LVC. The Miller Chapel on the extended route is named after him. During the centennial, Fred Miller served as PA Secretary of Education.
- Andrew Kreider Home Kreider built this estate in 1867, the original fencing and doorbell remain intact.
- Entrance to Quittie Creek Nature Park In 1989 a group of concerned Annville citizens approached Annville Township about unregulated dumping near a wetland in an abandoned limestone quarry near the Quittapahilla Creek. The group suggested that the quarry and additional stream-side woodland, owned by the Township, be developed for recreation. In response, Township Commissioners designated the 23 acre woodland area and quarry as a passive recreation park, called the Quittie Creek Nature Park.
- Annville Free Public Library Annville Free Public Library was built in 1949 by Gideon R. Kreider Jr. to serve the community as a local library.
- LVC Laughlin Hall The Hall was originally home to Dr. Gideon Fahnestock in the mid-nineteenth century. Today, this building holds several administration offices and is a part of LVC's campus.
- Lebanon Valley College Lebanon Valley College was founded in 1866 as a private coeducational institution on the site of Annville Academy. LVC became a four-year institution by 1883 as the lower grades were phased out.
- 8 Miller Chapel Built in 1966, Miller Chapel is a central fixture on LVC's campus built to commemorate the centennial of the institution.
- **LVC Admission Building** Built in 1905 after a donation from Andrew Carnegie, this building is one of the oldest remaining structures on LVC's campus.
