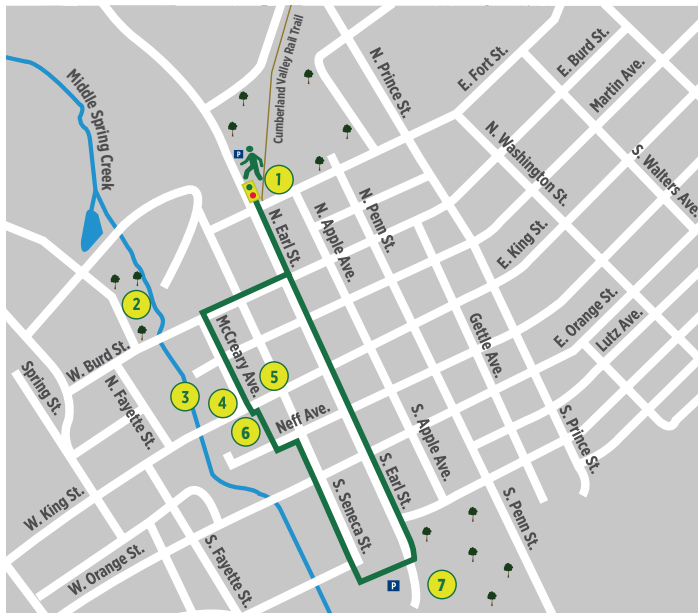



The Heritage Walk Route

Shippensburg Station

The Shippensburg Station trailhead provides comfort facilities as well as parking and community access to the 13-mile Cumberland Valley Rail Trail. The Cumberland Valley Railroad Museum is open every day in a restored 1956 Penn Central boxcar. The site also includes numerous outdoor artifacts as well as the Steam Plant Sculpture Path.

Branch Creek Children's Park

Branch Creek Park is located adjacent to the Borough of Shippensburg office. It includes accessible playground equipment, a gazebo, and a walking path along Branch Creek.

Coy Public Library of Shippensburg

Located along scenic Branch Creek, the Coy Public Library of Shippensburg offers restroom facilities and hosts children's and other community programming.

Chamber of Commerce

The Shippensburg Area Chamber of Commerce serves businesses throughout the community and offers visitor information.

Pague and Fegan Home and Hardware

Founded in 1856 by J. W. McPherson and Enos J. Forney, Pague and Fegan has been locally owned and operated for more than 150 years. A wayside marker in front of the store tells of the actions of local businesses during the Confederate occupation of the town before the Battle of Gettysburg during the Civil War.

Shippensburg Historical Society

The Shippensburg Historical Society collects and preserves the community's history and hosts regular events throughout the year. It is located in the historic Dr. Alexander Stewart House, a beautiful eighteenth-century limestone and brick mansion located in the heart of Shippensburg's Historic District.

Dykeman Park

Dykeman Park is a 56-acre open space area surrounding historic Dykeman Springs, which is on the National Register of Historic places. The park is accessible from the Ripple Field parking area and includes several trails as well as two ponds and a picnic area.
