

Westfield Route

Valley Christian Church

Now the Valley Christian Church, this was once home to the former Westfield High School, built in 1914 by architects Pierce & Bickford. The Westfield Public Library also resides on Maple Street.

Church Street
Church Street is the location of several churches: United Methodist (158 Church Street), St. John's Episcopal (205 Elm Street at Church Street), and First Baptist (122 Church Street). Further up Church Street is the former Wesleyan Methodist Church (242 Church Street). All of these churches are significantly old structures.

Colonial Hotel
Colonial Hotel is a historically significant building, in operation since 1887.

St. Catherine's Church
St. Catherine's Church was built in 1904 as a Catholic Chapel in memory of Catherine Adams.

MacKnight's Agway
Located at 120 North Street is the former New York Central Railroad Depot, now owned by MacKnight's Agway. Dubbed the
"Chautauqua Lake Route," the single track 32-mile electric interurban provided frequent passenger and freight trolley service in the
northern part of New York. The railroad crossed the Pennsylvania Railroad Chautauqua Branch at Mayville, climbed steep hills and
eventually dropped down a very curvy route to Westfield. At Westfield, the line crossed under the Nickel Plate Railroad to reach its
depot which was the west end of the New York Central Railroad station.

Krusen Cemetery

Krusen Cemetery is the only cemetery located within Borough limits. The cemetery was established in 1867 by Richard Krusen. It occupies a circular mound-like knoll, less than 100 feet in diameter, which rises about eight feet above the level of the surrounding land. Some are inclined to believe it is an old Indian mound, though no attempt to explore it has ever been made. This cemetery contains the graves of many early settlers. The limited area caused it to be filled quickly and burials there ceased several years ago.
